DID YOU KNOW?

There are over 562 distinct tribes with 300 distinct languages in the United States.

The Utah American Indian Digital Archive (UAIDA) is a gateway to the best resources regarding Utah's Indian tribes. With articles, books, government documents, tribal documents, oral histories, photographs, and maps pertaining to the Northwestern Shoshone, Goshute, Paiute, Utah Navajo, White Mesa, and Ute Indians, this unique archive captures the complicated history of Utah's tribes from multiple perspectives. The project, which stems from forty years of research conducted by the University of Utah's American West Center on behalf of Utah's Indians, offers tribal members, students, and researchers unprecedented access to information about the rich history and culture of Utah's native peoples.

UAIDA is a joint venture between the American West Center and Marriott Library at the University of Utah, with generous support from the State of Utah's Division of Indian Affairs and Department of Heritage and Arts.

Spanning Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah, the Navajo Nation covers seventeen million acres and constitutes one-third of all Indian lands in the lower forty-eight states. The Navajo Reservation is larger than ten of the fifty states in America and larger than Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, and Delaware combined. The traditional Navajo land is encompassed within the four sacred mountains that were created by the Holy People for the Navajos. In the east is Sis Naajinii, or Mt. Blanca; in the south, Tsoodzil, or Mt. Taylor, near Grants, New Mexico; in the west, Dook'oo'ostsiid, or Mt. Humphreys, near Flagstaff, Arizona; and in the north, Dibé Ntsaa, or Mt. Hesperus. Today the Navajos form the largest Native American nation with about 270,000 members, a majority of whom live within the Navajo Nation borders.

“A residency program...you mean like an internship?”

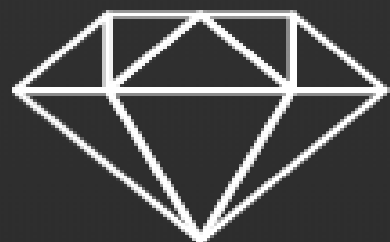
No, not like an internship. This interest group defines “residency” according to the “ALISE Guidelines for Practices and Principles in the Design, Operation, and Evaluation of Post-Masters Residency Programs.” The complete guidelines can be found in *Internship, Residency, and Fellowship Programs in ARL Libraries. ARL SPEC Kit 188*. (This kit is available as an [ERIC](#) document under ERIC Document number ED359970). Briefly, the definitions are as follows:

- ***Internship***: Pre-professional (Pre-MLS) work experience which takes place during graduate work, but preceding the terminal degree.
- ***Residency***: Post-degree work experience designed as an entry level program for recent graduates of an MLS program.
- ***Fellowship***: An experience designed to assist librarians, who already have some professional experience, in developing an area of expertise or managerial skills.
